

IDSN recommendations on agenda items of relevance to be considered at the 29th session of the Human Rights Council (HRC) (15 June-3 July 2015)

ITEM 3 - PROMOTION AND PROTECTION OF ALL HUMAN RIGHTS

Report of the Working Group on the issue of discrimination against women in law and in practice (April 2015)

In the annual HRC report, A/HRC/29/40, the Working Group addresses eliminating discrimination against women in cultural and family life, with a focus on the family as a cultural space. The Working Group notes that the expression "diverse families" encompasses, for example, non-traditional families resulting from inter-caste marriages. And, that in all these different forms of family, women tend to the subject to legal sanctions and to experience different social and economic situations. It is underlines that minority women living in caste systems are more likely to be found in these forms of family and are especially vulnerable to early and/or forced marriage, while men may have multiple households or second families with their de facto spouses or partners.

The different forms of family and their recognition by the State are influenced by a multitude of normative factors, such as caste. Although several international forums recognize family diversity, including "in different cultural, political and social systems", many of the aforementioned non-traditional forms of family are not recognized by all States. Given that State recognition is often a condition for families to receive services and benefits, such as accommodation and protection provided by the State and/or non-State actors, lack of recognition leads to the marginalization of these families.

• IDSN calls on states to raise the issue of gender- and caste-based discrimination in the Clustered Interactive Dialogue with the Working Group, scheduled for 18 June (15.00-18.00).
